## Introduction

World War I (WWI) was fought from 1914-1918 and involved many countries around the world. The length of the war, the number of countries involved, and the large number of deaths and amount of damage it caused was nothing like anyone had ever seen before. It was also called the Great War, because no one expected another war like it to happen ever again.

There were two sides in the war. The **Allied Powers** included France, Great Britain, Italy, Russia, and eventually, the United States. The **Central Powers** included Germany, Austria-Hungary, and Turkey.

The largest battles were fought in two areas. The **Eastern Front** was bordered by Germany and Austria-Hungary on one side and Russia and Hungary on the other side. The **Western Front** ran along Germany and Austria-Hungary on one side and France and Italy on the other.

## **Words and Terms to Know**

Armistice - an agreement by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting; a truce

**Eastern Front** - an area of fighting bordered by Germany and Austria-Hungary on one side and Russia and Hungary on the other; troops from Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey, Russia, and the Balkans fought here

**Western Front** - an area of fighting bordered by Germany and Austria-Hungary on one side and France and Italy on the other; troops from Germany, Austria-Hungary, France, England, and the US fought here

**Allied Powers** - a military alliance that included Great Britain, France, Russia, Italy, the United States, and others; the Allies were opposed to the Central Powers

**Central Powers** - a military alliance that included Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey, and others; the Central Powers were opposed to the Allies

**Trench Warfare** - a type of fighting that uses deep trenches, or long ditches, dug into the ground to protect the soldiers and also make it difficult for the opposing army to attack; fighting in these trenches usually protects soldiers from bullets and most artillery shells

**Neutral** - not helping or supporting either side in a war

**Propaganda** - a way to share information that tries to make people think or feel a certain way; it is usually political and always biased

**Liberty Bonds** - these were created by the government to help raise money for the war effort; by buying bonds, Americans were loaning the government money for the war, and the government would repay the loan after a certain number of years
